UNFORTUNATELY, December saw a spate of dwelling burglaries across the area with six occurring over a six-day period. Thieves **forced entry by way of 'jemmying' either doors or windows and** made searches of properties to find what they were after. On several occasions, nothing was stolen, lending itself to the explanation that they where after specific items and likely to be professional burglars. January has also seen a number of breaks and attempted burglaries across the area.

Please be extra vigilant in looking out for any suspicious happenings in your area and please consider the strength of your home security. Keep windows and doors locked and valuables hidden away out of sight, preferably in unusual places that would be hard to find. Consider the need to purchase separate window locks as they have prevented access being gained in some of the above attempted burglaries. Lots of external lighting around and secure fencing or hedging is useful although a fine balance must be met so as visibility onto your property from neighbouring premises is not lost. Gravel paths and driveways are good as they create noise when walked on. Securing side accesses helps to keep people out. If someone wants to gain entry to a property or outbuilding, you need *Continued on page 24*

Parish Council Meeting - 13th January - The best bits

Gypsy/Traveller sites

IN the first open session, a member of the public commented on a rumour that landowners have received letters asking about possible locations for mobile homes. On checking, this transpires to be gypsy/traveller sites within North Dorset. Cllr Della Jones commented that the district council has an obligation to allocate an area for gypsies/travellers, and that the existing Thornicombe site has been successful. Cllr Janet Allen has had this issue in her previous parish, and warns that the Parish Council should act quickly, and make sure that any highlighted potential positions are suitable, but more importantly also informing the Council of any reasons why a site is NOT ideal.

Obelisk fund

There still seems to be a bit of confusion. The fund stands at £2,423.72, however, we do not know who the signatories are – can anyone in the village remember? The money was originally raised by public subscription; therefore it seems appropriate that the decision has been made to discuss this matter at the Annual Parish Meeting in April (see future dates below).

What is happening about the Parish Plan?

It has been accepted for evaluation (meeting of 8th September last year), however, CIIr Harris pointed out that he did not wish to adopt it. Finally, after much somewhat heated discussion, it was resolved to assemble a "working party" of two councillors and three others, either parishioners or/and members of the original steering committee. This is to go through the various recommendations, see if they are still valid, or if they are now redundant (due to action already being taken or being not attainable) and to be realistic about how it can be used. At present, the group consists of CIIr Janet Allen, CIIr John Harris, Phillip Smith and Adrian Hodges, one more member

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is needed. Tony Dyer has requested that he is not included, due to the many, many hours he has already spent on it.

It was also resolved to pay travelling and other expenses to Tony Dyer however the estimate for further work was not debated.

Winter Maintenance

Parishioner David Ballinger has contacted our local MP, Robert Walter, asking why the local farmers were unable to use their tractors for snow clearance. In Mr. Walters reply, he highlighted the **original problems were that "red diesel" was not allowed to be used** to work on the public roads, and the high insurance was a problem. **On 3rd December 2010 it was agreed that "Red Diesel"** *could* be used in tractors that were snow clearing on the public road, however, the high insurance could not be resolved, and that it would have to be a private agreement between the farmer and their insurance companies. The query was also raised about members of the public clearing the pavement or public places of snow and ice, saying that if the public followed the guidance on Direct.gov.uk regarding snow clearance; it would be highly unlikely that any prosecution would occur. Chair Mick Hopper thanked David for taking the trouble and time to take this action on behalf of the entire village.

Issues regarding the collection of rubbish were discussed, along with the need for contingency planning for emergencies and this will be explored shortly.

The Continuing Saga - The Corner of Milton Road

Andrew Fox of The Royal Oak has confirmed he will make the planters, the size will be agreed with ClIr Janet Allen but these will be of a similar size to the planters outside the pub. Sally Dyer and ClIr Janet Allen will co-ordinate to use discount vouchers for a local garden centre to purchase any items needed to complete the project within budget. The Parish Council were very grateful for the **donation of dwarf spring bulbs from Gerry Spivey (of Gerry's Plants** at The Rings).

Future dates for your calendar

The Annual Council Meeting is on 11th May 2011 following the local elections, this will take the form of a standard meeting, with the election of a Chairman and Vice Chairman for the next municipal year. Previously this also included the Annual Parish Meeting, and it can be a long night. However this year, the Annual Parish Meeting will be held on 20th April 2011. The Annual Parish Meeting is not a council meeting. It is a meeting of the parish electors and should involve village organisations **such as the Women's Institute, POPP,** M.A. Neighbourcar, the police and all other groups. The agenda should be set by the groups and they should contact the Parish Clerk with the items or report they wish to air. The meeting will be chaired by the chairman of the council. Everyone is welcome to celebrate local activities and debate current issues. All this together with the allure of nibbles!





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Flogging dead horses is not a good idea

BY the time you read this Milborne Moviola will have presented the film "From Time to Time". The new hearing loop system is now fully operational so you can hear it too.

If the Reporter hits your mat before the 26th January then please support us. If not then it is important to note that Dorset Moviola has given the trustees a reprieve with these three productions. If we fail to get sufficient numbers attending Moviola there will be no more in the future.

The film is (was) a period drama, filmed at Athelhampton and is a haunting ghost story spanning two worlds, that are two centuries apart. A Manchester lad Tolly (Alex Etel) is sent to spend Christmas with his grandmother (Maggie Smith) at her crumbling country pile (not to be confused with the Village Hall) during the final days of World War II, where he travels back in time to appear as a ghost in the Napoleonic period and begins to unravel an age-old family mystery. A hunt back in time for missing jewels becomes a voyage of self discovery.

Further Dates for your diary:

"Made in Dagenham" on Wednesday 2nd March 2011 which is a dramatization of the 1968 strike at the Ford Dagenham car plant, where female workers walked out in protest against sexual discrimination.

"The King's Speech" on Wednesday 6th April 2011 which is a riveting, intimate account of how a British king triumphed over a speech impediment with the help of an unorthodox speech coach.

Saturday 9th April has been earmarked as the evening for the Village Quiz. Last year's winners have the task of writing the questions and with Peter Dunkley as the team leader I suspect the questions will be interesting, testing, quirky and chosen to ensure that everyone can have a good time.

The MUGA has now been completed, well nearly. The boys will be back in the spring to add a touch of colour (green) to the black stuff and to provide the permanent ball court markings. Hopefully things will have settled down by then and all the fears and trepidations will be resolved as well. The MUGA space will still be available for the village fete, etc and we are assured by the contractor that because we have applied a permeable tarmac surface, water will drain through, not sit under the hard tarmac surface usually found on the highway, waiting to burst through during any icy spell into a pothole. The only restriction placed on its use is that it is not suitable for the hard impact roller blading or skateboarding and if you look at the 'Dorchester Massive' that is a concrete skatepark. The tarmac must also be given time to harden or cure. The trustees will be relying on the skateboarders to observe this limitation and for other responsible members of the community to help police the space (in the nicest possible way of course). We may have other options up our sleeve for the boarders so come and speak, we are still human and willing to listen!

With the completion of the MUGA (under budget and on time, I might add) the trustees have, at a stroke, not only completed the last remaining issue identified in the regeneration survey of 2002 and 2006 but also "ticked the box" on two of the major issues identified in the Parish Plan of 2009. A new Hall review is now underway to help set out the plans for the future as we continue with the regeneration process. Do we continue to modify and extend the existing building or build new; do we continue on our own or work with others such as the Doctor's practice?

What is for certain is that "doing nothing" is not an option, nor is flogging a dead horse! So watch this space, read your Parish Plan outcomes, check out the Village Website and join in the fun, it will be an open and inclusive process. Richard Lock

Bailey's Valentines Cheesecake

I make this in a heart-shaped metal mould which I've had for years but it can be made in a tin of any shape. It is a good way of using up any Bailey's Irish Cream which is left over from Christmas.

Ingredients for the base

One small packet of biscuits (Hobnobs, Digestives, etc.)

75g butter Ingredients for the topping 200g/250g cream cheese 1 sachet gelatine powder 100ml hot water 100ml double cream 200ml Bailey's 150g caster sugar Method



- 1. Melt the gelatine in the hot water and set aside to cool.
- 2. Melt the butter and add to the crushed biscuits.
- 3. Put biscuit mixture into base of loose bottomed cake tin and press smooth with the back of a spoon.
- 4. Beat the cream cheese and sugar together then add the cooled gelatine.
- 5. Fold in the Bailey's.
- 6. Fold in the lightly whipped cream.
- 7. Spoon the topping on top of the base and chill in the fridge.
- When ready to serve, remove sides of cake tin then grate a little

chocolate on the top or sprinkle on some cocoa with a sieve.

Moviola presents **"Made in Dagenham"** at Milborne St Andrew Village Hall on Wednesday 2nd March 2011

THIS film is a dramatisation of the 1968 strike at the Ford Dagenham car plant, where female workers walked out in protest against sexual discrimination which ultimately led to the Equal Pay Act. The story of those crusading workers shows that the women clearly felt strongly about being treated unfairly and now with hindsight we can see that it was a really significant moment in British history. Back in 1968, the working-class motor-town of Dagenham in East London seemed to inhabit a different planet from Carnaby Street and the Swinging 60s. Although fashion and pop filtered through to the factory workers, the Dagenham revolution was not about sex, drugs and rock 'n' roll, but about women's wages. When their work was reclassified by Ford's new grading system to 'unskilled', and they found that teenage boy floorsweepers earned more than they did, the women were furious, so they downed tools and came out for three heady weeks, the first female strike at the car plant. When the women who led the strikers at the Dagenham Ford plant marched on Westminster in 1968 they carried a banner with the words "We want sexual equality". Unfortunately, it had not unfurled and read simply "We want sex". The wolf whistles and car horns that supported them en route cheered them on nonetheless.

When film producer Stephen Woolley heard some of the women reminiscing on the 40th anniversary of the strike in Radio 4's The Reunion series, he realized it would make a classic tale of selfempowerment in the cinematic tradition of Educating Rita and Shirley Valentine. And that's how Vera, Eileen, Sheila and Gwen found themselves advising the film-makers on everything from the bikes they rode to work – they couldn't afford to buy the new cars whose seats they stitched – to the buckets they put out to catch rainwater from the leaking workshop roof. With Sally Hawkins and Geraldine James as fictional strike leaders Rita and Connie; Miranda Richardson in a splendidly spirited performance as Barbara Castle; Bob Hoskins as the supportive union organizer Albert and Dagenham born 60's pop star Sandie Shaw singing the theme song it is a truly inspirational story.

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Have you met ... Margaret Kirk?

WHEN in the winter of 2008, we formed the team to try and keep a village magazine, Margaret volunteered to help. She was there when difficult choices had to be made, and there to make us laugh when we were dealing with necessary and longwinded decisions. She was absolutely instrumental in ringing around countless companies, pubs and organisations getting us new advertisers, which we needed to enable the magazine to pay for itself. This is her story . . .

Margaret Kirk was born in Bedfont, Middlesex

in 1948, to Mary and Donald Ross, to the sound of jet engines, as the BEA hangers were just across the field from where they lived. She says that her education was very erratic as they moved every few years, her nickname at school was 'lanky lamppost'! Her father loved buying new houses but each new house meant a different school, all within the catchment area of Heathrow Airport where he worked upon leaving the Scots Guards in 1947 and up until his retirement in 1979. Her father was number 99 on the payroll!

Margaret continues: I am VERY proud of my

father's Highland Scottish heritage and three generations of unbroken military service to the 'Crown'. My grandfather was highly decorated during the First World War and his brave actions are mentioned in several history books and indeed on the internet too. He was with the Scots Guards and retired after 32 years with the colours with the rank of Major. He was also a forerunner of his Regiment's charity as after the First World War he used to go around the East End of London seeking out the homeless soldiers, giving them food and finding them jobs. Paying particular attention to his own ex-regimental comrades. He was 6ft 4in and not one to be messed with by all accounts! *What about your life*?

Throughout my working career I have had several jobs. Mainly based around customer service, admin and secretarial. I always preferred working in a technical engineering environment, although I did have a **year's contract at Bournemouth and Poole College, working for "Services to Business". I met my husband Neville, when I worked for an** engineering company that was producing naval equipment, I was his secretary. Later we had our own business for five years in Southampton. We sold it in 1990 and moved to Dorset. I have two children, Stephen and Lisa and two grandchildren. *And living in Milborne St Andrew?*

We are still VERY new to the village and have lived here for nine years, and the best thing about living in Milborne St. Andrew is the beautiful countryside and the friendly community, I can't think of a downside to living in Milborne St. Andrew, and I wouldn't change it at all. *Can we talk about hates, fame and heroes?*

Hates are irresponsible pet owners who abuse their animals. My claim to fame is that I have sung on BBC Radio Cornwall, sung with The Band of The Royal Signals and The Band of The Scots Guards. I have also sung with Opera Del Mar on Brownsea Island. And my hero was my Father, he was a very sociable person, we always had parties and for thirty years he raised money for his ex Regiment. This was a follow on from his Father, who loved to organise Highland Games, shoots and parties. **My Father's brother was also in the Scots Guards but was killed during** the Second World War aged 26. He was born in the Tower of London **and Christened in 'The White tower'. My grandfather was stationed** there at the time, together with his family.

Who is your fantasy dinner date?

Rabbie Burns, he was a romantic Scottish poet and a larger than life character. He has left us a legacy of beautiful songs and words the most **famous of all, 'Auld Lang Syne' which is sung not only at New Year but** at the closing of a lot of functions where people have gathered. He was a very sociable person.

When did you last throw caution to the wind?

Two years ago, I sang at my daughter's wedding in Cancun, Mexico. I

had no idea who would be accompanying me. I took my sheet music and left the rest to chance!!

Your most embarrassing moment?

Loosing my hooped petiticoat on stage in a production of Pirates of Penzance. I could feel it slowly slipping to the floor. When it did I just side stepped out of it and flicked it into the wings, like it had a life of its own! Much to the shock/horror of the producer, who exclaimed to the

> prompt "now what's she up to" as I was often playing practical jokes on the cast. Can you tell us your favourite charity, website, and TV programme? Pets as Therapy, is my favourite charity.

Although, I also support the Colonels fund of the Scots Guards, Battle Back (a department based at Headley court). It comes under the Help For Heroes umbrella. I love Facebook and it helps me to stay in touch with the Regiment. My favourite **TV programme currently is 'Come Fly with Me'. I** used to work at London Heathrow and find the humour of the programme highly amusing and very true to life.

Tell us about your life now?

My hobbies have always been singing solo, fund raising for charity and bringing people together to have fun and socialise. Since my health forced me into early retirement I had two choices. Sit at home and mope or get out and live life to the maximum that my health would allow. I chose the latter and have become more actively involved in the social life of the village. I have always embraced volunteer work through my life. The very first charity work I did was when I was 11 years old. I joined the British Red Cross Society and at sixteen I was in charge of a nursing section. I was one of the youngest in the county at that time. Aged 21, I became a member of the WRVS and helped deliver meals on wheels to the village and surrounding area, where I lived at the time.

Seven years ago, we adopted our little dog Charlie from the National Animal Welfare Trust. He had been at the centre for a year because he was so aggressive. However, with regular attendance at obedience classes, for me as well as him, he became a different dog. So, much so, that we registered him with the Charity Pets as Therapy. Charlie visits a rest home in Dorchester and visits every single resident who wants to see him. It is so rewarding to see the smile on their faces as we visit them and they love to stroke him. To some it brings backs positive memories of a beloved pet dog. Charlie has a few party tricks which he performs for them also.

Two years ago, I was voted on as Chair of The Wednesday Social Club. This office has been exciting and mentally challenging not only for me but the committee also as they assist me with my whacky schemes. During the birth of the *Reporter* and its first year of publication I was responsible for the advertising. I relinquished my post due to other commitments in the village. I was elected Chair of the Village Lunch Committee two years ago and still hold the post today. The ethos of the Village Lunch is one of community, fun, sharing good food, at a reasonable price and a social occasion. Grateful thanks go to Sarah, Andy and the 'team' at The Royal Oak who now supply the fabulous food as numbers have greatly increased and a 'family kitchen' can no longer keep pace.

During the summer of 2009 the 'Fox' family were all set to purchase and move into The Royal Oak. However, a change of heart at the brewery put their plans in jeopardy and we the villagers were faced with an almost derelict pub and the prospect of it being run by yet more (short-term) brewery tenants as had happened over the last few years. I popped into the village hall for a coffee one Friday morning and the room was in uproar at the brewery's new proposals. I offered to pen a letter to all media contacts to raise the profile of the campaign. The Parish Council also got behind the well-organised village "Save our Pub" campaign. The rest, as they say, is history.

As usual we advise patients to check their medicine cabinet and make sure you are well stocked with over the counter remedies such as paracetamol, other pain killers and basic first aid items.

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Everyday wines for an everyday price



In your Garden Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of *Designer Gardens* Designing your outdoor space

BEFORE embarking on your garden plan, it is vital to assess how the garden is going to be used and what individual features you would like: a space for entertaining; a vegetable garden; a garden to attract birds; a low maintenance garden or a plantsman's garden. Features may include water – a pond or a bubble fountain, a favourite sculpture, garden furniture, a barbeque, arches, pergolas, lighting to highlight particular features and so on.

Have a look at where the sun falls during the day? If the garden is in full sun most of the day you may want to create an area of shade by planting a small tree or introducing a pergola to sit beneath. If your garden is very shady, then a lawn may not be a good idea and the area may be better with a hard surface such as paving or gravel.

Consider how much time you want to spend maintaining your garden – everyday or just a couple of hours a week, or every now and then. Is it your main hobby and you like to spend hours tinkering away to your heart's delight, or would you rather just sit and look at it. Think about the surfaces you like – lawn is much less expensive to lay but is high maintenance; whereas a hard surface has a high initial outlay, but is easier to keep looking good.

Where do you get the best view of your garden from within the house – from the kitchen window, or the sitting room? You may wish to

make the view from this window the main focal point. It is always a good idea to have a focal point that will draw the eye to a particular place in the garden.

Think about



the views – are they good or bad. Do you want to enhance a particular view with your design or hide it? If the garden is overlooked you can disguise the boundaries by planting shrubs and climbers keeping the eye within the garden itself. If you have something in the garden that you want to hide create a focal point somewhere else. For example if you want to disguise a shed or oil tank, putting trellis in front of it will only serve to attract the eye to the very place you want to hide. It is better to hide it completely by putting it behind a wall or fence and incorporate it into the design for the garden. Focal points have an almost magnetic effect of attracting attention and diverting your gaze away from undesirable views.

If your garden slopes there may be a need for a retaining wall or **some steps. Divide the garden into thirds and don't make the break** halfway down the garden. One third to two thirds is the ideal ratio to work to. Different levels and changes of height can make the garden more interesting to look at. This can be achieved by introducing a pergola along a pathway, an arbour or archway. Your focal point can, for example, be viewed through the arch or pergola.

Once you have made a list of all the items you want to include, decide where they are going to be positioned and how much space you need to allocate for each one. This is the time when you may need to (reluctantly) reduce your 'wish list'. Too many features in a garden can



res in a garden can make it look cluttered and smaller than it is. A well designed garden can make the garden look much larger than it actually is.

The next step is to measure your garden and draw up a plan. Using tracing paper over a grid, experiment

with different shapes and patterns taking into consideration aspect, seating areas and pathways from gates or doors – try to link them all together in a pleasing way and always give people enough room to move about.

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December and 2010 Weather in Milborne St. Andrew

DECEMBER 2010 was the coldest December I have recorded in 40 years. There were air frosts on 23 nights with the lowest night temperature of -8° C on the 18th and 25th. It was only the last four days of the month when the day temperature rose above 5°C. The other two particularly cold Decembers were in 1976 and 1981. Precipitation during the month including 21cm of snow was 51.7mm which was 43% of average. (1cm snow is equivalent to 1mm of rain) Fog persisted all day on the last four days of the month as warmer air melted the snow.

The year 2010 was a cool and dry year. It started with a cold and snowy January and ended with a cold and snowy December. June was the best of the summer months. August was particularly cool, wet and windy. Total rainfall for the year was 847.2mm which was 86% of my 40 year average but very close to the annual rainfall of 870mm in 1978. Reservoir levels in some areas of the country are at 70% of their normal levels for this time of the year and this is causing some concern but locally the Environment Agency report ground water and river flows at 'normal' levels. The average temperature for the year was 9.54°C which was the coldest since 1991 but very close to the average temperature of 9.60°C in 1977. The 40 year rolling average annual rainfall and temperature for Milborne show no particular trend in any direction. Climate Change and Global Warming does not seem to affect Milborne St. Andrew but my records only go back 40 years. The 'Central England Temperature' was established by Professor Gordon Manley using data from a number of sites in the Midlands and dates back to 1659. This C.E.T. shows a small but steady rise of 0.8°C in the Annual Mean Temperature over the last 350 years.

The snowdrop and daffodil buds are now starting to show and make the words of William Morris appropriate.

"Full soberly the earth's fresh hope begins, Nor stays to think of what each new day wins: And still it seems to bid us turn away From this chill thaw to dream of blossomed May".

Milton Abbas Sports Club – Cycling

CYCLING is fun, but some people who ride are nervous of cars on the road and feel that they should make themselves as insignificant as possible when a car approaches by either riding along hiding in the gutter or stopping until the car has gone past. Neither of these actions are necessary and can in fact be quite dangerous.

The most sensible attitude to adopt is that you, as a cyclist, are equal to other road users and should not be too submissive. Cycling with care and courtesy is of course required, but a hesitant, wobbly cyclist may cause confusion and increase the risk to you. Especially at this time of year when the sides of the road are muddy and full of leaves and potholes, riding too close to the left will make your journey unnecessarily uncomfortable.

Taking a good position on the road will ensure that you can be seen by other road users - and your own view of the road is improved. Where possible you should ride towards the centre of your lane. Here the roads are flatter and you can be more clearly seen by traffic from either direction. In traffic you will of course move to the left, but stay about 0.5m (1.5ft) away from the left edge. Riding closer to the edge leaves you no room for manoeuvre in an emergency. On our narrow country lanes, other road users will wait until there is a suitable place to pass whereas pulling over in to the gutter may encourage them to try to pass you at an inappropriate point in the road. There are many simple tips and techniques to improve your skills and confidence for riding safely on the road, especially as a child or as an adult cycling with children. Milton Abbas Sports Club is planning the spring and summer schedules for Bikeability sessions (cycling proficiency).
