WITH an excellent array of stalls and supported by Dorset Police and Fire and Rescue the Milborne Mini Soccer Club Family Fun Day has been heralded a success and may be the first of many future events and fund-raisers for the club.

The first main event was the Milborne Mini Soccer coaches and parents v The Royal Oak pub Tug-of-War. The Royal Oak team emerged first from the club-house, clearly confident of victory with their chosen anthem of Queens "We are the Champions". However as the Milborne Mini Team strode out to their theme tune, Bonnie Tyler "Holding out for a hero" it was clear that the two teams were well matched and this was far from being a one horse race. The Royal Oak won the first pull sending the Milborne Minis sliding to the ground to "another one bites the dust". But it was not all over and as the Milborne Minis won the second pull anticipation in the crowd built. The final pull however was won by The Royal Oak and left the pub team victorious, winning the Cup and the glory. But that was not the end of the story as in excess of 70 children took up the rope in a bid to make their own challenge to the pub team.

It was then time for an Adults v Minis football match, however despite putting up a good fight, the adults were clearly overwhelmed by the crowds of children on the pitch. This was followed by the Mini Soccer Presentation where we all applauded the enthusiastic young players and the future of Milborne Soccer as the coaches hung their medals around their necks and handed out trophies to our proud Mini Soccer members.

All in all the day was an enormous success, we have raised £1,059.06 for the development of the new mini soccer pitches at the rear of the club. However all of this would not have been possible without our amazing coaches, our massively keen mini soccer players, the wonderful men and women who helped to set up and run the stalls, the incredible Neil Coad who compered and sang at the event but more importantly the people of Milborne who turned out to support us. We are overwhelmed by the number of you who came to support our efforts and it was truly a wonderful sight to be seen watching the people of Milborne St. Andrew enjoying their home ground as the sun shone down and music played.

Playing Days and Times



FOLLOWING the successful trial 'run' to Morrisons at Bridport for shopping and lunch and the launch at The Royal Oak Milborne St. Andrew, **Bus2Go** is now pleased to be offering a planned service for June. These destinations were chosen from a passenger survey that was carried out on the trial run. This survey will continue to be circulated amongst new passengers using **Bus2Go**.

Please note. The service is operating every other week. This was in response to the passenger survey. However, should there be enough passengers wanting to go on a shopping trip, this could easily be arranged on the weeks that there is no other outing.

We had a very favourable response from passengers that were on the trial run. Comments were, the bus was very comfortable, plenty of leg room, quiet inside and easily accessible, low step for front access and tail gate for wheelchair access at the rear. Inside secure space is available for wheelchair, baby buggy and safe stowage of shopping.

As you will note, the bus destinations are very flexible. During term-time we can use the bus between 9.00am and 2.00pm (depending on where the bus is going to and from).

School holidays and weekends the bus can be used at any time during the day or evening. More adventurous outings are planned for during the school holidays, with a selection of destinations that will hopefully appeal to all ages and at reasonable cost. We want to offer everyone an opportunity to get out and about to enjoy the Dorset countryside this summer.

Seeds that grow

A SUNNY day; an array of lovely gardens; quadruple chocolate brownies: some of the pleasurable moments of my day.

In search of inspiration for what I could write in my letter this month, I went to visit the open gardens in a nearby village. I'm not a gardener (I'd only open mine as an example of how not to do it), but it was interesting to see how, although many of the gardens had some similar plants in them, no two were the same or even similar. Each garden was unique.

And each plant that had been grown was the product of a combination of a seed, and care and nurture, sun and water, and the love of those who grow them.

The best gardens were those that had been given the most care. They are the ones in which the plants flourish and produce beautiful flowers and fruit.

In the Bible Jesus often uses the imagery of growing things to explain faith. He tells stories about wheat, weeds, vines, mustard seeds and so on. He talks about how God wants our lives to flourish. But if that is to happen, we need to remain rooted in him. Our faith needs nurture and care if it is to bear fruit, in just the same way as a plant.

Obviously sun and rain and manure and fertiliser are not what will grow our faith, though they definitely help a plant. What will help our faith to grow is spending time with God, allowing God to tend our wounds, to forgive our wrongdoings and wrong thoughts, to open ourselves to God's love.

One of the most common misapprehensions is that God only uses special or important people for his work. It's a load of rubbish. God's garden is open to everyone; all we need to do is ask him to plant a seed of faith within us. As we tend that seed, through prayer, reading the Bible, worship, spending time with other Christians, sharing God's love with our community, it will begin to grow and bear rich fruit.

One of the joys of being part of a church community is growing alongside others. A garden containing only one plant would look very bare; in the same way a Christian who tries to go it alone will never reach his or her full potential in faith, for God has created us to be part of a body. A leg without the rest of the body would be of little use.





April Weather in Milborne St. Andrew

WHAT a difference a month makes! Last month it was dry rivers and dusty fields and now it is swollen streams and soggy gardens. Such are the vagaries of the British climate. April rainfall in Milborne was



209.1mm which 358% of average and, nationally, it was the highest April rainfall since records began. The last high April rainfall was in 2000 with 175.3mm. Between 1971 and 1991 the highest April rainfall was in 1972 with 89.8mm but there have been five

Aprils since 1991 with over 100mm of rain. There were 11 air frosts during the month and ground frost occurred on several other nights in the lower parts of the village. As if to remind us that nature always has the last say, there were storm force winds and driving rain from the North East on the night of 28th and it is unusual to have strong winds from that direction.

After the record rainfall in April, it may seem surprising that there are still drought orders operating in some areas but there are several categories of drought. The April rain may have ended the Meteorological drought and averted an Agricultural drought but the Hydrological drought which has built up over the last two years still exists and it will take our usual amount of winter rainfall to bring ground water levels back to anything like normal.

April 2012 may have been a disappointingly cool month but it has been worse. On 26th April 1981, 90mm of snow fell with drifts that were in evidence into May. The snow was wet and heavy and brought down electricity lines leaving the village without power for a day. Pluvius

Important points for discussion included the rising birth rate, complications in birth due to the rise in the number of older women giving birth and a higher number of multiple births. 

More than a Movie with 'War Horse' (12A)

THE film War Horse is based on a marvelous best-selling book by author Michael Morpurgo and is set against the sweeping canvas of rural England and Europe during the First World War. It begins with the remarkable friendship between a horse named Joey and a young man called Albert, who tames and trains him. When they are forcefully parted, the film follows Joey's extraordinary journey as he moves through the war, changing and inspiring the lives of all he meets, before the story reaches its emotional climax in the heart of No Man's Land. The all-star cast is amazing, with newcomer Jeremy Irvine in his heart-wrenching role, Peter Mullen, Emily Watson, Tom Hiddleston, Toby Kebbell and Liam Cunningham, all of whose performances are magnificent. This gem of a movie is an inspirational story about courage and relationships.

- Six inches of fast flowing water can knock you over.
- Two feet of water will float your car.
- Flooding can cause manhole covers to come off, leaving hidden dangers.
- Don't walk or drive through flood water.
- Don't let children play in flood water.
- Don't walk on sea defences or riverbanks.
- When water levels are high be aware that bridges may be dangerous to walk or drive over.
- Culverts are dangerous when flooded.
- Look out for other hazards such as fallen power lines and trees.
- Wash your hands thoroughly if you touch floodwater as it may be contaminated.

Have you met... Philip (Pip) Bowell

I was born in the King George VI hospital in Barkingside Essex on 17th February 1945 by Caesarean section. There were still V2 bombs being sent from Germany, and my father was at home when he heard the *Crump* of a bomb while my mother was at the hospital. He jumped on

Crump of a bomb while my mother was at the hospital. He his bike and pedalled towards the hospital,

increasingly over broken glass, until he got to the hospital where my mother was. The hospital was intact, but the row of houses opposite was there no longer.

We moved to Kent when I was four and I attended a small school in the next village of Hempstead. It was a lovely walk on a tarmaced footpath through fields and cherry orchards, and I often delayed my return home to play on the way. This could be in the snow in winter or looking for orchids in summer. From there I went to the local

grammar school, which I enjoyed, but did not work too hard at. In the year before taking 'O' levels, the family moved to Briantspuddle and I went to Hardye's school. With a change of school, examining boards, syllabus and choices, the one year spent there was an unmitigated disaster, with the crowning insult being CCF (Combined Cadet Force) which I hated with a passion. I left school with very little to show for my later education.

My father was an analytical chemist whose work involved starting a chemistry department at Winfrith AEA. It was this that brought us to Dorset from Kent. My mother was a teacher of commercial subjects having worked at Weymouth Technical College where in reading a dictation to shorthand students found the class reacted unfavourably to a passage about rabbits. There were Portlanders in the class! Later she taught at Kemp Welch School in Poole. There is at least one of her Poole students still living in Milborne. I have one older brother who spent from 1998 to 2006 working on the 'largely non-existent' computer millenium bug. I was very happily married to Jackie for nearly forty years during which time we both involved ourselves in village activities. We had two sons who are both married and successful. This year both boys are to become fathers and make me a very happy grandfather. Jackie died of Myeloma in December 2007 leaving a massive hole in my life. I am lucky to have found a new supportive partner in Liz.

Having done so badly at school my prospects seemed pretty poor, but I was lucky as the wife of the then headmaster of Affpuddle Primary School knew I was interested in things biological. She suggested I contact the Pathology Department of the Dorset County Hospital for a job as she was leaving to adopt an infant. I was invited to talk to the Director who seemed interested in me. I received a letter inviting me to work there starting on the next Monday. The letter added that as I was unlikely to receive the letter until late morning to start at 2.00pm. I stayed for 48 years! As training in the technical aspects of the work were given 'in house', with opportunities for college study, it suited me well as at an early stage I had a compulsion to learn about the science of the laboratory. I was successful at increasingly specialist examinations and eventually qualified in Bacteriology and Virology, finally running the Virology section of the Microbiology Department. This involved working on diagnosis of viral diseases from mild influenza strains to HIV and the more insidious Hepatitis C. Latterly, I also developed an interest in the laboratory computer system which allowed me some extra travel and have lectured both in the USA and Dubai in the UAE.

How long have you lived in MSA

I moved into Bladen View immediately following my marriage and honeymoon in 1970.

What do you think is the best thing about living in MSA Despite its vastly increased size since 1970, it is still a friendly place to live. I try to make a point greeting people and people generally respond. I have decided it must be the centre of the world because even though it is a village in mid Dorset, it is so easy to get to so many places: Dorchester, Blandford Forum, Poole, Weymouth, the Channel Isles, Bristol, Bath, Salisbury and even London is not too hard to get to, and therefore, anywhere abroad.

Is there a downside to living in MSA

There can't be much or I would have left!

Are there things you would like to change about MSA

I have always thought we need more trees in the village, and I would

dearly love to see the church clock, the dove cote and water wheel restored.

Your pet hates

Misquoted sayings, like, 'Off your own back', instead of 'Off your own bat'. Bad English habits, like 'Would of . . .' instead of 'Would have . . .' Stupid parking, including 'Hazard lights on means I can stop anywhere'.

Your claim to fame

I make no claims; it is for others to judge.

I like flowers, cooking and ironing. I restore milestones. I am trying to write a book involving the history of Milborne St. Andrew from roman times to the present. I donate platelets monthly through the National Blood Transfusion organisation.

Your most embarrassing moment

On the day I got engaged I was given the champagne bottle to open. I loosened the cork which flew up to the ceiling, bounced off and hit my future father-in-law on his bald head.

Hobbies and interest

Gardening, mountain walking, singing, travelling, my 1932 Austin Seven and MGB Roadster and driving them, my tortoise, badminton, bell ringing, milestones, botany, bird watching, dry stone walling and working at Durlston Country park.

Favourite charity

I support many charities including Swanage Railway, RSPB in memory of my late wife's aunt Miriam, Woodland Trust in memory of my great aunt Clare, Medecin sans Frontieres, The Milestone Society, supporting a child in Albania through World Vision.

And anything else

I feel fortunate in having been in a small village and seeing our children through the village school. In those days in the 70's we were one of a group of parents who actively supported the school through the Friends of the School. These were very active times for the group, with several madcap outings; a memorable visit to Old Wardour Castle, playing "Sardines" in all the nooks and crannies; a coach trip to London and the museums; and a long walk (well it was long for the five year olds) from here to Tolpuddle and back, just one of several "let's see" walks around this part of Dorset. We achieved much for the school, but also generated a group of friends in the village which I still feel indebted to for continued friendship.

Sue Gould – Pip has also had his Thespian moments, when he played a vicar in "proof of the poison" back in the early 1980's with the Milborne Players (I think I played the murderess!) He and Jackie have been leading lights in many of the village organizations. I remember their famous "12th night" parties after Christmas, when all the family joined in, no babysitters required, crackers party games, good food and happy children, what could be better!

In your Garden

Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of Designer Gardens

What about a Greenhouse?

A GREENHOUSE is a real asset in a garden allowing you to grow all manner of plants in a protected environment, before letting them loose in the garden.

Originally greenhouses were just functional and date back to at least Roman times. These days the greenhouse is often decorative as well as productive. Let's face it, it should be beautiful to look at, as it is generally the most dominant feature in the garden.

Siting the Greenhouse -

You may not have much choice in where the greenhouse is sited as it will often

depend upon the existing layout of your garden. Try not to site it too far away from the house, or you may forget about it.

You can site the greenhouse E/W, – the traditional orientation, if you intend to use the greenhouse all year round. However, if you are like me and generally only use it in the spring and summer months then a N/S orientation makes the best use of the light.

You will need to allow access all around for cleaning the glass, so it is best positioned away from trees, shade and overhanging branches.

Does Size Matter?!

You don't really want to go any smaller than 2m x 2m or it will prove impossible to do anything in it. As a minimum there should ideally be a



central path, with raised benches on one or more sides. I use a fixed bench on one side and a bench with removable shelves on the other so that I can grow tall plants like tomatoes and cucumbers when the seedlings are large enough to go outside. Don't forget to allow for ventilation — automatic vents are a good idea. Shading is also essential and there are lots of options available — from greenhouse shading paint (removable) and the cheapest option to bespoke roller blinds. And you will have another roof to collect rainwater from, so rig up some guttering to catch the water either in a water butt or

in an underground reservoir.

To me, a greenhouse is somewhere to get away from it all. It's so peaceful and relaxing sowing a few seeds, or pricking out the seedlings; and it's great when the weather is inclement – you can still be outside in the garden! Sometimes plants may be just an afterthought; your greenhouse could contain a nice comfy chair and some books. I once heard someone say that she likes to go into the greenhouse to read her magazines, listen to music and get away from it all – lovely!'

A greenhouse can be a bit of a tie, but once you've had one, you won't want to be without it. And don't worry about watering when you go away – neighbours will often be persuaded to water your plants with the promise of some 'just-picked' tomatoes or cucumbers.

Longmead Community Farm

WHEN Steve and Mandy Beech first walked into this run-down building in 2005 they must have had little idea of the immense challenges that lay ahead. Originally a boys' reformatory built in 1858 by the Mansell-Pleydells of MSA, the 16-bedded building had been gifted by one charity to another in the hope they could put it to use for altruistic purposes. After a long period of reflection the house was transferred from Green Pastures Christian Centre to a new, stand-alone, independent charity called Longmead Community Farm, with the aim of supporting vulnerable families.

Enter Steve and Mandy who both had jobs and a daughter at school in Poole! Yet, incredibly, operating on a wing and a prayer and with little money but many helpers, they have restored this building into a comfortable welcoming house. Painting and decorating has been a large challenge. Beds and other furniture came from a Bournemouth hotel, which was refurbishing. Comfortable settees and other essentials mostly arrived from Freecycle. The chairman, Peter Jack, has raised funds for replacement windows doing a sponsored coast-to-coast walk. There has been hardly any government funding, so the work depends totally on donations and grants.

"Its given my family a very good boost from what we have been through . . . a lifeline for us because we were in B&B and we got offered to come to this place and we did and we love it and we keep coming back."

Longmead Community Farm (www.longmead.org) has been running for seven years in its present form offering residential weekends and respite for families under pressure. These families have variously been described as 'hard-to-reach', 'dysfunctional' and 'troubled', and in most cases are referred to us by social services or churches. Each family member is given time and attention by trained volunteers, who are good listeners. As we work around the farm, cook and eat together there is space in a calm environment rarely available at home - to work through problems and find solutions. Children help too - outside with the animals and garden, and indoors with cooking (under supervision of course) table laying and washing up. Most parents have not had a night away since the arrival of the children. Many have never eaten together as a family. We try to meet their individual needs and encourage them to share and communicate better, and families have said this experience began to change their lives.

"We lit candles and said prayers for my dad. That was like a base for me to say goodbye to my dad. I generally felt the love of everybody together. Walking down the lane with the candles it made my night . . . it was so good everyone was together."



This unique whole-family approach is now attracting wider attention. Recently, Sir Al Aynsley Green, former Children's Services Commissioner working at government level, came to visit us, and noted the quality of the love and care that families received.

Longmead can be found from Milborne St. Andrew by travelling 1.5 miles toward

Blandford until the road drops into a dip. Look for a bus stop on the right and slow down, looking for the Longmead sign (quite small) on the right just before the bus stop. Be careful – hazardous turning.

Can also be approached on the footpath from the village starting from Lane End which joins up with Jubilee Way.
