Flood Wardens' Statement

FOLLOWING comments received recently, the Flood Wardens would like to make the following statement:

The role of Flood Warden is entirely voluntary. We offer our time and our efforts solely to help village residents.

Flood Wardens have absolutely no authority to tell the Environment Agency, District Council, Parish Council or members of the public what they should do. If decisions regarding flood protection need to be taken, we meet and consider the issues, formulate opinions and then give those opinions with supporting justification at the proper forum, namely, the Parish Council Meetings. Subsequent decisions are made by the Parish Council, not the Flood Wardens.

The Flood Wardens will seek to help residents by raising awareness of bad practices that could make flooding more likely and directing residents to sources of information and guidance as provided by the Environment Agency and local authorities. The Flood Wardens also liaise with the Environment Agency and District Council as required.

If, as a resident, you feel strongly about flooding related issues and/or decisions that need to be made relating to flood protection; or you wish to make your thoughts known regarding the role of Flood Warden, the Parish Council Meetings are the proper and effective place to do that. 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Fascinating facts, famous people and places in Dorset

AT this month's meeting of the Village History Group we had a speaker, Brian Bates, who skilfully presented a talk about famous people and places in Dorchester. His talk was illustrated through relevant pictures on the screen. We heard about many famous people such as the ambitious post graduate socialite and his wife who set up a public school in Langton Matravers. He had a swimming pool created at Dancing Ledge where he and his male pupils regularly swam naked. Apparently, his school was appreciated by 'the quality' including Ian Flemming. Amongst other famous people were the three Thomas Hardys, the last woman to be hanged in Dorchester, the eccentric millionaires who campaigned against hanging by protests at hangings e.g. paying for aeroplanes to 'strafe' the area of the hanging, etc. Also of buildings such as the original Thomas Hardye school (yes he is the third one), the Mill Street slums of Fordington and how a benefactor petitioned Price Albert to grant money to rebuild many dwellings without much success but he did create a mission hall, public baths and wash houses. There were so many other interesting things. Unfortunately, there were only seven people who came to hear this talk which, although it did not affect Brian's presentation, it was disappointing that more people didn't come.

Next month on the 13th June there will be an 'in house' meeting where anyone can join the group to suggest topics, to tell us about the history of their home or WWI relative or to deliver a presentation.

On 13th July a speaker, Mr Forrester, author of 'Fordington Remembered', has been invited to deliver two talks one about the life and times of Mill Street the slum end of Fordington from 1860, renamed by Thomas Hardy as Mixen Lane. The other a true-life story recorded six months before the death of Ivy Gale born in 1917 one of seven children and two adults brought up in a one up, one down cottage, with one outside toilet and one outside tap, with only an open fire to cook on. The Work of all God's People

In the past, there was in the Church of England a very unhealthy tradition that the work of the church was for the Vicar, and that everyone else was there to receive that ministry.

Thankfully in recent years we have returned to much better and more scriptural practice with the recognition that every baptised Christian has a vocation and calling from God, both within the church and perhaps more importantly outside in the world. In our benefice, we would not have churches were it not for the many people who give their gifts, time and money sacrificially. We remain grateful for all who help us to retain a Christian presence in our villages through our churches.

Some lay people are trained for specific ministries recognised formally by the diocese. These are Licensed Lay Ministers (LLMs) of which we have one in our churches, Lay Pastoral Assistants (LPAs) who have a particular role in visiting people in their homes and in hospital, and Lay Worship Leaders (LWLs) who help to lead Sunday worship.

Salisbury diocese recently held a celebration of lay ministry, which was well attended and provided an opportunity for people to renew their ministries, start new ones and share together in worship. They also attended workshops aimed at giving them new skills and ideas.

Two brief accounts of the day follow. The first written by the Revd Rosie Coldwell from Milborne and the second by Emma Hughes, one of Puddletown's LWLS

"On the morning of 21st April lay ministers from all over the diocese gathered at Salisbury Cathedral to celebrate Lay Ministry that is carried out in our diocesan churches. The cathedral was full and it was a joyful service when new Lay Pastoral Assistants (LPAs) and Lay Worship Leaders (LWLs) were commissioned by Bishop Karen. Existing ministers also stood to be re-commissioned and all had opportunity to commit themselves to serving others within their own parishes.

"Janet Voke was presented as a new Lay Pastoral Assistant for Milborne St. Andrew by Rev Rosie Coldwell and existing LPAs and LWLs from our benefice were also present to be re-commissioned and to re-commit themselves to God's service.

"Bishop Karen welcomed everybody and briefly explained the purpose of lay ministry which is to be God's 'agents of love, hope and care in the world' and to join with the clergy and other church workers in serving others within their parish(es) according to their various gifts. This may involve visiting the lonely and housebound, the sick and/or bereaved or prisoners, and offering practical help to those in need and praying for them. Or it may involve working with young people. Always they must be willing to work as members of a team to bring Christ's love and compassion to others." (Rosie Coldwell)

"I travelled up to Salisbury with Bob Todd (LWL/LPA Puddletown), Jean Jeffreys (LWL Puddletown) and Sue Britton (LPA Dewlish). After registration in the cloisters followed by coffee and a browse through the Sarum College bookshop stall we entered the packed cathedral for our re-commissioning service.

"After lunch we all went our separate ways to attend our chosen workshops on subjects such as Messy Church, Voice Projection, Photography, Sermons and Prayer. On our return journey back to Dorset we shared some of the things we learnt on our workshops with each other.

"The only bad thing was, after such an enjoyable day, we won't be back for re-commissioning for another three years now!" (Emma Hughes)

Serving God is a joy and a privilege for all Christians: God uses our hands, hearts, words and deeds to share his love and continue his work.

If you are a baptised Christian, unsure of where your calling lies or who has let their faith lapse, do come and have a conversation with any of us; we would be really pleased to walk with you as you seek to discern what God might have in store for you.

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St. Andrew's Church Notes We prayed

SARAH has asked us to be involved in Thy Kingdom Come. This is a global prayer which movement, invites Christians around the world to pray between Ascension Day (which was on the 10th May) and Pentecost (on the 20th May) for more people to come to know Jesus Christ. What started out as an invitation from the Archbishops' of Canterbury and York in 2016 to the Church of England has grown into an international and ecumenical call to prayer.



At St. Andrew's we decided to invite our congregation to either walk and pray or pray for five friends. We printed off the resource sheets from the website and encouraged individuals to either do both or select a preferred option.

The prayer walking activity was as simple as it sounds – praying as you walk. When we prayer walk we are stepping into our authority as God's children to bless people and places in Jesus' name. This simple task is a great way to bring transformation to our local community by asking God to break in. A few people chose to undertake this activity to walk and pray as individuals.

The most popular was the praying for five friends. The suggestion was that you choose five people you would regularly like to pray for and write their names down onto a list. Once you have settled on five names, you should commit to praying for them regularly. We used the on-line resources of a selection of prayers to give to willing participants and gave each one a length of braid with five knots so that each knot represented a friend.

Ascension Day is when Christians celebrate the departure of Jesus Christ from Earth into the presence of God. A few people from Milborne joined others to attended a short service on the hilltop outside Dewlish. Pentecost which is celebrated on the seventh Sunday (49 days) after Easter, commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and other followers of Jesus Christ. As last year parishioners from all the churches in our Benefice will walk together to Dewlish Church where we celebrate together and share a communion service. Pam Shults

Brave Milborne resident!

IT'S amazing what you find looking at old newspapers this one is from The Salisbury Wiltshire Journal Monday 18th April 1808 (not for the squeamish) :-

"A wonderful instance of resolute and patient endurance of pain occurred last week at the Salisbury Infirmary – Henry Barton of Milborne St. Andrew, Dorset had been sent to the Infirmary with a large tumour on his back, which was extracted on Wednesday. During the whole operation he did not utter a single exclamation; though he once observed to Mr Coats, the surgeon, when the knife was blunted by the callous substance 'that knife does not cut so well as the last.' The tumour was 18 inches in circumference and when extracted weighed five pounds and a quarter!" Linda Wright

Milborne Movies, June 8th "Maudie"

At Milborne St. Andrew Village Hall, tickets £3.50 at the door. Door and Bar open 7.00, film starts 7.30pm.

This is the true-life tale of arthritic Maudie Dowley (Sally Hawkins). Living with her disapproving aunt in Nova Scotia in the 1930s, she's the proverbial square peg in a round hole – not that that can overcome her indefatigable spirit. After meeting fellow loner Everett (Ethan Hawke), against all odds her life starts to fall into place, including a burgeoning career as a painter.

The film focuses on Maud's austere romance with ill-tempered, emotionally stifled fishmonger Everett Lewis (Ethan Hawke), and her concurrent development into one of Canada's loved folk artists.

Theirs is a difficult start, and there's no soft-soaping here: Everett is even seen hitting Maud on one occasion. It's a challenging moment, and kudos is due to both writing and actor that we are prepared to give Everett even half a chance. Still, astonishingly, this "pair of odd socks" gradually fall into a quiet, undemonstrative kind of love, Maud drawing out his vulnerabilities as he cautiously supports her developing career as a painter.

Like the central pair's romance, Maudie is a slow-burn, unshowy film, as much about looks and silences as what's being said. Hawkins' and Hawke's nuanced performances make this complicated, unconventional but delicately moving relationship ring perfectly true.

Shot in Newfoundland and Labrador, the achingly beautiful locations give a striking context to this sensitive, beautifully acted film, which lingers long after the final frame.



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Green Spaces, woods and Sids at the Parish Council meeting

THE Annual Parish Council meeting of Milborne took place in May, where re-election of Chairman, Joy Robinson, and Vice-Chairman, Sarah Fox, were agreed by the councillors attending. Other specific posts such as Flood Wardens, Rights of Way Officer and Neighbourhood Plan officer were also agreed for the coming year of the Parish Council. It was noted that the Flood Wardens contact details were not readily available for residents to access if required (as was the case very recently), and the clerk said he would look into it.

Neighbourhood Plan issues occupied the meeting with, first, a consultation document from the NPG referring to Green Space designation. This is a way of protecting specific areas of land that are seen as being beneficial to the character and context of a community. Land that is designated as 'green space' is provided a level of protection from development or other activity that may change the nature of it. The map that accompanied the NPG's request showed Parish Council-owned land, such as the allotments - although there was some discussion about the actual boundary - as well as privately owned land, such as adjacent to The Grove. Although there was some disagreement with the need to designate council land in this way, the majority of the PC accepted the NPG's comments.

The second Plan discussion arose from correspondence from residents regarding the NPG's survey's preferred site of Camelco, opposite the old dairy site. Residents were concerned about the 'community woodland' close to The Rings that was included in the proposal. Councillors sympathised with the correspondence, noting that there was a huge amount of problems associated with this part of the development scheme, such as cost and current poor state of the woodland, forward management and safety issues of access and surroundings. But there was agreement with Cllr MacNair who said there was a duty to assess the proposal by the developer as it stands however unsuitable it may now appear to all parties.

The call for volunteers for a community speed watch was discussed, with the meeting at the skittle alley in the Royal Oak on Saturday 9th June with the attendance of District Co-ordinator, Martha Perry, and PCSO Mike Sinnock, was formally announced. On the speed theme, Clerk, Colin Hampton, said he now had the 30mph stickers which are to be given to residents living on the main road and Milton Road to put on the sides of their wheelie bins.

The site meeting with Highways was reported back on, which was to assess Milborne's roads against the criteria for installing a speed indicator device (SID), which displays the current speed to an oncoming vehicle. An informal survey by Highways showed that the Dorchester Hill position (near to the existing '30' flashing sign) may be a suitable location for a SID. Likely costs were said to be £450 for surveying three possible locations, $\pounds 2000$ for the sign and $\pounds 750$ for three posts. The SID could then be moved from post to post by volunteers, who would also be required to change the batteries every fortnight or so. A solar pack is available to negate the need for this, but can only be added after the SID warranty period expires.

County and District Councillors, Hilary Cox and Jane Somper, were present earlier in the meeting to give their reports. Cllr Cox spoke about the effect that the reorganisation of Dorset councils were having on NDDC; day-to-day delivery of services and functions of the council were continuing but the big decisions - or those that may impact upon forward decisions of the new council - were being held. She said that there was uncertainty about what jobs and how many would be lost due to the amalgamation of Dorset district councils. Cllr Smith asked why, against the backdrop of savings from jobs being cut, that NDDC tax payers should be expected to pay more Council Tax. NDDC payments are currently the lowest in Dorset and the likelihood is that 'levelling up' will occur, meaning higher bills for Milborne residents. He suggested to Cllr Cox that if this is the case, then NDDC residents should see improved services for their increased rates – although speculated that this wouldn't happen.

Dorset day 1st June/Thomas Hardy birthday 2nd June Dorset lamb steak braised with cider topped with rosemary cobbler

DORSET is famous for many food and drink specialities. Among them are Dorset Knobs, Blue Vinny cheese, Dorset Apple cake and Dorset cream tea, although this is claimed by Cornwall and Devon as well.

Thomas Hardy often wrote about Dorset food and drink in his novels and poetry.

One culinary scene from Thomas Hardy's *The Woodlanders* describes Giles Winterbourne's dismay when be

Giles Winterbourne's dismay when being told a slug had been spotted in Grace's salad when he had been trying so hard to impress her.

"Not but what that snail might as well have come upon anybody else's plate as hers". "What snail?" "Well, maister, there was a little one upon the edge of her plate when I brought it out; and so it must have been in her few leaves of wintergreen".

"He wasn't alive, I suppose?" said Giles, with a shudder on Grace's account. "Oh no. He was well boiled. I warrant him well boiled. I don't mind 'em myself – them small ones, for they were born on cabbage, and they've lived on cabbage, so they must be made of cabbage."

In *Two on a Tower* Hardy writes about an old grandmother scraping down and eating the outside of a pudding and then serving up the remains to her disapproving grandson. This strikes a chord with me as I have been guilty of doing this myself on more than one occasion with home-made frozen Christmas pudding!

But my very favourite Hardy food-related scene is of Tess being offered a strawberry by Alec and being persuaded to take it. "D'Urberville began gathering specimens of the fruit for her, handing them back to her as he stooped; and, presently, selecting a specially fine product of the "British Queen" variety, he stood up and held it by the stem to her mouth. "No - no!" she said quickly, putting her fingers between his hand and her lips. "I would rather take it in my own hand." "Nonsense!" he insisted; and in a slight distress she parted her lips and took it in." (Perhaps a for-telling of the later scene in the forest?) The descriptions of Giles as a travelling cider-maker in The Woodlanders are so realistic you can almost smell the apples. When reading this we remember that Hardy helped his father make cider every year. Also, the Harvest supper in Far from the Madding Crowd and the carousing of Sergeant Troy at the time of the storm make one aware that these celebratory country feasts were all part of Hardy's early life. On his death bed, Hardy asked for kettle broth, which was a dish of his childhood made of finely chopped parsley, onions and bread cooked in hot water. Also, a rasher of bacon cooked over the flame of his bedroom coal fire, just as his mother used to cook in the kitchen of the family cottage at Bockhampton.

This month's recipe uses cider and also lamb, perfect for a midsummer Dorset feast. Dorset Horn is one well-known local breed of



sheep, also the Portland is a smaller sheep but very hardy. It would have to be to cope with the strong winds of the Isle of Portland! A bit like the Shetland sheep, which is the smallest British breed of sheep. I would start a Dorset themed meal with watercress soup and finish off

with Dorset Apple cake and clotted cream.

Ingredients – to serve 6 For the braised lamb 6 lamb steaks 2 onions, chopped 2 carrots, diced



Method

Heat 2 tablespoons oil in a frying pan.

Gently fry the onion for a few minutes then add the carrots and celery and fry until softened.

2 sticks of celery, diced

200 ml cider

4 tablespoons oil

mint jelly/sauce

or mint jelly.

2 tablespoons flour

2 tablespoons of rosemary jelly* or

Spread the softened vegetables onto the base of a very large casserole dish.

Add the remaining 2 tablespoons of oil to the frying pan and when hot fry the lamb steaks over a high heat, in batches, until well browned. Arrange the lamb steaks in a single layer on top of the vegetables. Add two tablespoons of flour to the fatty juices in the frying pan then gradually stir in the cider and lastly add the rosemary jelly. When smooth and slightly thickened, pour on top of the lamb. Cover the casserole dish tightly and bake in a moderate oven for about one and a half hours.

Add the cobbler topping, turn up the oven to high and cook without the casserole lid until the cobbler is risen and brown.

For the rosemary cobbler topping

200g self-raising flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 75g butter 1 teaspoon very finely chopped fresh rosemary Milk to make a soft but not sticky consistency

Method

Mix the flour with the salt and rosemary Rub in the butter until like breadcrumbs Add enough milk to make a soft but not sticky dough Knead the dough gently and roll out until about 3/4 of an inch thickness

Using a cutter, make into 6 rounds, brush with a little milk or beaten egg. Turn up the oven and place the rounds on top of the lamb in the uncovered casserole for the last half-hour of cooking.

Serve with buttery mashed potatoes or Jersey Royals and some green cabbage – making very sure there are no slugs hiding!

WEDNESDAY 2nd May was a beautiful sunny day and we met in the Village Hall car park to begin our trip to see the amazing sand sculptures at Sand World in Weymouth. Most sculptures are changed annually or biannually but one, The Origin of Species, has been there for four years and they are keeping it to see how long it can last. A few sculptures have areas that have been painted, a PVA wash is used to create a film which when dry is like paper and can easily have the colour added. The sand is reused each year and if it has been painted is washed clean when remixed. We were then able to relax with a coffee or tea and cake while Jeremy from Sand World gave us a talk.

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One Milborne family's war



LAST month we saw the Lock family at the outbreak of World War 1 with all six sons in the forces. This was so unusual that their father Edward Lock received a letter from the King. This was reported in the Western Gazette on 22nd January 1915 along with a photograph. (There was also another family of six from Frome)

"An unique example of loyalty to King and country comes from Milborne St. Andrew a little village between Blandford and Dorchester, the six sons of Edwin (sic) Lock all being with the Colours five in the army and one in the navy. The parents have received the following letter from the King –

Privy Purse Office Buckingham Palace 14th December 1914 Sir I have the honour to inform you that the King has heard with much interest that you have at present moment six sons serving in his Majesty's forces. I am commanded to express to you the King's congratulations and to assure you that his Majesty much appreciates the spirit of patriotism which prompted this example, in one family, of loyalty and devotion to their sovereign and Empire. I have the honour to be sir your obedient servant F M Ponsonby Keeper of the privy purse."

As we can see Henry was already wounded and as I have been unable to trace his army records we do not know if he returned to France but he was an army pensioner.

1916 was a very bad year for the family. In April Alec was reported missing after the fall of Kut al Amara and presumed to be a PoW (350 men were captured). On the 31st May Frank was killed when HMS *Queen Mary* was sunk at the Battle of Jutland. One thousand, two hundred and sixty-six men perished on his ship and as a stoker Frank had little chance of surviving. He is remembered on the naval memorial at Portsmouth. In June Augustus was discharged from the army being physically unfit due to TB, his condition worsening after three months in Gallipoli. On July 1st William was killed on the first day of the Battle of the Somme. He has no grave but his name is on the Thiepval memorial. On September 8th Alec died of dysentery whilst being a PoW he was buried in Baghdad North Gate War Cemetery. His death was not officially known until 1918.

From 1916 until 1920 Augustus's health deteriorated. He spent sometime on the Isle of Wight at The Royal National Hospital for Consumption and was examined regularly by the pension medical board. For Henry he suffered three personal losses when in 1917 his elder daughter, Ida Kate, died aged eight, and the following year saw the death of his eldest son, Ivor George, aged 11 and his wife, Eliza, aged 34.

With the end of the war Henry, Augustus and Vernon are still alive but for Henry and Augustus their health worsened and on the 22nd February 1920 Henry died aged 42 in Taunton and on the 15th October the same year Augustus died aged 29 and was buried in Milborne. For Edward he had lost five sons it is impossible to imagine his grief: there is no record that the King acknowledged this! Vernon was the only son to survive and he died in 1958 in Middlesex. Their sister Kate Newham died in 1945.

At the time of writing only Henry has no mention on the Commonwealth Commission War Graves role of Honour. I have sent all the information and documents I have for him and they are considering this; hopefully as the only Lock son not to be recognised this will be rectified soon and all five boys will have the honour they deserve. After a lot of discussion, it was agreed to set up a new focus group consisting of residents and the committee to explore options to meet the residents parking needs.

The committee members were shocked to hear that some people are allowing dogs to run freely on the grounds and not, as requested, keeping them on the lead. In particular, three Stafford Bull Terriers regularly are brought to the hall grounds, always let off the lead, and their owners obviously do not pick up after them. 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A Good Read: Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine by Gail Honeyman

Tears may be an inevitable response to some of the scenes and thoughts of this most damaged but valiant woman. To reveal any more would be to spoil the experience of reading this amazing debut novel. Understanding dementia

"I am a dementia champion; this means I can deliver fun and informative sessions to potential 'dementia friends'. This project, started by the Alzheimers Society, aims to change the language we use to talk about dementia, help people be more supportive and informed about how they can help be 'dementia friends' in their community.

After hearing about Barbara Windsor's Alzheimers diagnosis and her husbands words about how he needs to know people will understand when she acts 'strange', I feel it is time we all take a moment to learn a little more about this disease of the brain. Ten per cent of people over 65 are likely to get dementia, Alzheimers is a form or dementia; there are many forms. People are affected differently by the disease; that is why we have to treat each person as an individual.

I work in a care home, some of the residents have dementia, some are content, a few are sometimes distressed. The symptoms of this disease do not define the person or represent the person, that is why we must understand that it is an illness and can be frightening for the person living with it and incredibly difficult and sometimes lonely for their carers and supporters.

Things you can do to help; start with understanding and empathy. Sometimes highly patterned carpets or tablecloths can be confusing and frightening to a person living with dementia.

Sometimes people may ask the same question many times, be patient. A person living with dementia can not remember many facts, but they will remember how you made them feel. This fact in itself should help you to adjust your behaviour, no one wants to be the scary person who makes people feel sad!!

People can live well with dementia, the illness is not curable at the moment but, with support, we can help those living with the disease to stay independent for longer. How many people live in your community aged over 65, please remember 10% are likely are to be living with a form of dementia. Understand that you and your community can help them to feel better, live better and continue to live well."

The very long arm of the law!

YOU may have recently heard about a case that Dorset County Council Trading Standards Service took to court involving animal cruelty. A Somerset farmer and haulier took some cattle to a Dorset slaughterhouse in the middle of the night when no staff were present. When he tried to unload them into a holding pen one of the cows was down on the floor in the back of the lorry and was unable to stand up. He first tried to encourage it to stand but soon lost his temper and kicked, punched and pulled its tail violently. Fortunately, this was all captured on CCTV and we could start an investigation which soon revealed a whole range of other offences the farmer had committed. Just at the point we were ready to charge him he decided to leave the UK for America with no intention of returning. What he hadn't accounted for was the fact that the investigating officer had recently retired from the Metropolitan Police after a career of tracking down international money launderers. The officer managed to not only track down the farmer to a hotel in Arizona and revoke his ESTA tourist visa but also arranged an arrest warrant for when the farmer returned to the UK which was duly served.

The farmer eventually pleaded guilty and was fined as well as

being ordered to pay the prosecution costs. Furthermore, as his American ESTA visa was revoked he will never be allowed to visit the USA again.

The questionnaire had an open category for items not listed; a proposal for a gibbet was put forward and unanimously carried - light-heartedly of course. Flooding and sand at the village hall

FURTHER to the decision taken at the Parish Council AGM not to keep sand at the village hall, we would like to remind anyone who feels that their property is at risk to keep their own stock of sand. The sand at the village hall needs to be removed so please feel free to help yourself to sand from the bulk bags in the Village Hall car park to build up your stocks; once it's gone ... it's gone!

An alternative solution is the Hydro Snake/Hydro Bag which is easier to store and quicker to lay in the event of flash flooding. They can be purchased from the likes of B&Q. To find out more please log onto "Gravitas Flood Defence".

Just to reassure everyone the ground water level rose to 137cm at its highest level for this year in April. This was monitored once or twice a day by the flood wardens and the new infrastructure instigated by Steve Lord seems to be working.

As you will probably know we can call in a pump that has been allocated to MSA to move the water through our flood defences and out of the village more quickly, this was put on standby but was not needed.

We will be using the *Reporter* to keep everyone informed regarding flooding matters and remind you that fresh sand bags can be delivered to the village if the village as a whole is under threat.

Britain's rarest reptile found at Thorncombe



THERE has been much celebrating over at Thorncombe Wood Local Nature Reserve recently! Our Rangers found the rarest British reptile, the Smooth Snake, on the reserve the first one ever recorded on the Black Heath part of the site. The Smooth Snake is protected by British and European law and requires a licence to survey them. The species is dependent on well managed heathland and it is therefore a huge achievement for the team; it shows the restoration work and continued management of the small patch of lowland heath is providing the perfect habitat for heathland specialists such as Smooth Snake and Nightjar.

Love Your Verge!

Litter Free Dorset recently launched a campaign to highlight the different wildlife and flowers that can be found living along the roadside – but are threatened by discarded litter. Artist Claire Nuttall got involved with the campaign and produced large signs featuring different creatures to celebrate hidden wildlife areas and urge

people not to throw litter out of their car windows. Charlie Wild, Litter Free Dorset Project Officer, said: "We want to remind drivers that these verges that they drive past, sometimes on a daily basis, are home to a whole host of wildlife; from black-eyed daisies, moths, poppies, hedgehogs, dormice, all the way up to deer which can frequently be spotted."
