## Parking at the Village Hall to be improved


ACCESS to Village Hall's clubs and events will soon be far more straightforward with improved parking arrangements recently approved by Dorset County Council. The capacity of the car park will be increased by 50% with a 10 metre extension to the existing car park providing parking for up to 10 more cars at

We all know that we should be walking, cycling or using public transport but the reality of living in our rural community often makes this impractical or impossible. A walk to the Village Hall in the dark, especially on a cold, wet, winter's evening, is by no means pleasant nor particularly safe and many will choose to drive there. Sadly, the lack of parking discourages many from joining in events simply because of the difficulties in getting to the hall after being forced to try to park elsewhere.

Now that the plans have been approved, finance for the project has to be found. Around £25,000 is needed and grants are being sought. Provision for the future installation of Electric Vehicle charging points is included in the plans and should make it more attractive to potential donors. Further in the future, we hope to install solar panels on the south-facing roof of the Village Hall to complete the project.

However, don't hold your breath, £25,000 is a lot of money but . . . watch this space!

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# A worldwide stage for Milborne

MILBORNE could soon be going global, with the village taking a starring role in a new internet venture that could make residents celebrities on their doorsteps. It seems everybody wants a piece of the Dorset action and a company - IseeYouLol (ISYL) wants to livestream the goings-on of a historic and quaint rural village for a world audience, whose appetite for an authentic and picturesque English setting is insatiable. However, ISYL has settled for Milborne, seeing the potential and relative ease of installing cameras on people's homes and other buildings

installing cameras on people's homes and other buildings without the obstacles inherent in other villages – Cerne Abbas, for instance – of Grade I and II listed properties and other restrictions. Milborne had also come onto ISYL's radar with the prominence of the village's online presence – the community Facebook page has won fans far beyond the parish lines, who are less interested in residents seeking recommendations for plumbers and carpet fitters but revel in the discussions about village life, the

history, anecdotes and the exact qualification to be a REAL

If enough residents sign up to the new venture and pledge to allow a camera to be fitted then the whole village can be watched. in effect making it like a real-life Truman Show. Internet viewers the world over will be able to follow life as it happens, the vignettes of daily life set against the backdrop of a typical Dorset village, brick and flint buildings with a smattering of thatch together with the roar of 40 tonne lorries slaloming around the Post Office chicane without losing a beat, as a soundtrack. It has the makings of an internet sensation and ISYL is excited at the limitless possibilities. Much as reality TV makes stars of its ordinary people, Milborners are likely to become celebrities just by going about their normal life, whether it be going to Gray's Stores for a loaf of bread and a scratch card or being pulled by their dog along Milton Road. It's a safe bet to reckon pooches will become online stars probably eclipsing their owners - with the online masses obsessing over how Fifi looks today, whether Bully has put on weight and being aghast at Minty's owner for not picking up after she's deposited on the pavement.

Of course, if MilborneLife does go viral, it will be a honeypot for influencers and actors keen to make their mark on the stage that's offered to them on a plate here in the village. Some may hone in on the historic, dressing the part - baling twine for belts and so on - and riff on an old Milborne craft like hurdle-making, wandering along The Causeway with a bundle of hazel slung over a shoulder, or trade in the old village cottage industry of Dorset buttons, which is likely to arouse curiosity and delight around the world. Other viewers who are more interested in the here and now of the growing village and will be more focussed on the development of Milborne, with the new Huntley Down site offering much fascination as well as the blank canvas of the soonto-be developed site at the top of Blandford Hill. The pace at the building site of Fox View is not thought to catch the attention of many though. The ubiquity of virtual reality (VR) headsets will also make it a possibility for users worldwide to fully immerse in the Milborne experience, putting themselves on the streets where

the new celebrities are watched daily. What an experience, being able to walk the famous streets and lanes of a gem of a Dorset village in the comforts of, say, an apartment in San Francisco or Shanghai, marvelling at the architecture whilst watching one's step over the flood-deposited gravel in The Square and negotiating 'Sorry for the inconvenience' roadwork signs and cones. But what's in it for residents who decide

to be involved? ISYL are offering to pay residents in a cryptocurrency such as BitCoin (#BTC) to allow for a camera to be installed on their properties. This may present a problem for those who may have difficulty in exchanging this currency but it's hoped the Post Office will trade #BTC for high value items (such as first class stamps) and the shop is likely to trade the crypto for Curly Wurlys, though if the rate increases this is likely to

be bumped up to four pack of toilet rolls. Who knows, if the interest around Dorset buttons grows as ISYL thinks it will, it could become the next cryptocurrency – VR users will be able to trade on the street with the highly-decorated embroidered buttons with other MilborneLife fans and it will only be a matter of time before the currency, ButtCoin, (#BUTT) gains traction and takes its place at the bottom (to start with) on the world exchanges.

#### The Ta-da Moment

A young Vicar went into the local first school to talk to the children about Easter. He asked the pupils what the first words were that Jesus uttered after the resurrection. The children pondered the question seriously but were slow to give an answer. Then one small girl put up her hand, and enthusiastically responded: "Ta-Da".

We don't know what those first words of Jesus following his rising were, but we can safely say that they were unlikely to have been "Ta-da", the first recorded use of which took place only in the 1900s.

The origins of the word appear to have their roots in the attempts to imitate in spoken word the sound of the fanfare flourish a trumpet or similar instrument makes when accompanying the arrival of an important person or moment.

Ta-da may not have been Jesus's first words following the resurrection, but in many ways his rising from the dead could be seen as a ta-da moment. Certainly it was the arrival of an important person and heralded an event of significance.

The resurrection was a moment when the devastation and loss brought about in the crucifixion was transformed into hope and presence for his first followers. And it is a moment that continues to transform the lives of Christians today, because it reveals that God's life is stronger than death, that no situation is ever completely hopeless.

The power of the resurrection which so astounded Jesus's earthly friends in the first century is something that still gives life to Christians today. It is at the heart of our faith.

The resurrection doesn't mean we will never face difficult times — all human beings meet them — but it does mean that despair and darkness will never have the final word. There is always something greater and better to come.

As I write, the Ukrainian conflict rages. Many of us feel powerless to change things; our tears are nothing compared to the suffering of the Ukrainian people. We see what happens when a lust for power by one individual gets out of control and causes mayhem and suffering for millions. Many struggle to believe in a God who allows this kind of destruction to happen.

But God reigns through consent not oppression. God does not impose power on people but allows freedom of choice — we choose whether we live by love or a lust for power which tramples over anything in its way, by domination or humility, by caring only for ourselves or thinking of others too. When people make bad decisions, then consequences occur which sadly can affect many others.

It's not only Christians who behave well, of course, but the resurrection does give us hope that love is greater than hate, light more powerful than darkness and eternal life stronger than death, that one day in God's time all will be well.

The ta-da moment of the resurrection can sustain us through truly difficult times. In the crucifixion the early disciples believed that God had let them down and had left them to face the future alone. Through the resurrection their hope was restored. God had not died on the cross, and death was not the end.



My prayer is that the Easter declaration "Christ is risen. He is risen indeed," will bring you hope in a dark world and help you trust that evil will never have the final word.

# Mars and Bras, a talk at the Wednesday Club

SADLY our planned talk by Brian Bates on Edith Piaf had to be cancelled as Brian is recovering from having had a stroke and was unable to attend. We hope he will be well enough to give us "The Little Sparrow Talk" at a later date.

We were very fortunate to have our very own Josie Wright who stepped in at the last minute and saved the day!

Josie is very anxious that people should document their lives in writing and hand this on to the next generation. If we don't later generations will never know the working conditions, attitudes and opinions of the times that we lived through.

Her talk was about the lives of two women, her mother and herself.

Josie's mother went into Service in London at the age of 15. She was fortunate to work for titled people, her first employer being Sir Edwin Lutyens. She received £2 a month plus food and a room. Over the years she changed jobs bettering herself each time. One of her placements was at Longleat, the Marquis of Bath's residence. From here she went to be 2nd housemaid to the Marquis of Salisbury, in London. War was then declared and she moved to working in a munitions factory, it was here at a dance she met Josie's father. She then had to get permission to leave and was sent to EMI where the work was very hush-hush and it wasn't until after the war they learned they had been working on radar.

Josie's parents married and she was born the following year. They all lived in one room until her brother was born when they were allocated a new council house.

Looking back on what we have now, life sounded very hard but as Josie says "what you have never known you never miss".

At 16 Josie started work at the London Transport offices in Chiswick. She was very shy and others in the office wanted a bit of fun so they sent her to the tool shop for 'a long rest' where she waited for a long time, before the foreman took pity on her and sent her back. She was paid £5 a week, men doing the same job were paid more. Girls had to wait to be 21 before they had real wages.

The 1960's arrived, it was a great time to be young; fashion, pop groups, rock and roll and fun.

Her next job was at Berlei, who made bras and girdles. To quote Josie "when you were in a Berlei bra you could be confident that everything was in the right place and nothing would move bar an earthquake."

She then moved to work at Mars. There was a sugar factory and a chocolate factory where Josie worked in accounts. It was here that

she first came into contact with a computer which was huge and housed in its own room. There was a special mat, to remove dust



from shoes as you delivered punch cards to the technicians who had to wear protective clothing.

Moving to the 70's Josie had become a mother and she left office work, never to return. For the rest of her working life she always worked in some capacity with children which was her true vocation.

We are most grateful to Josie for such an interesting talk to which I don't feel that I have been able to do proper justice. She is such an entertaining speaker with many amusing anecdotes.

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 6th April when we will be visiting Keyneston Mill for a cream tea and those who wish to do so can look round the Botanical Gardens. We will meet in the village hall car park at 2.00pm to arrange car sharing.

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
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### Sources of local music

DORSET has been fortunate in that there has long been a recognition of traditional music in the county both religious and secular.

In the early nineteen hundreds, two brothers, the Hammonds, cycled around Dorset visiting as many places as they could to enquire of old tunes and songs that older folk could remember. As they went, they wrote them down, even if they were just scraps of tune or short stanzas of words. One source was a Mrs Penny in Upwey who could recall over 200 different pieces, but there were many others from all over the county. All were written down. Eventually, all this handwritten material ended up in an important collection, that of Cecil Sharp and managed by the English Folk Song and Dance Society in London. This material in its original form is all available online. A compilation of some of these was published in 1966 by two of Dorset's musical experts; Joan Brocklebank and Biddie Kindersley both of whom were at some time musical directors of the Briantspuddle Singers.

Thomas Hardy and his family were associated with the music known as West Gallery Music, so called because it was performed in the raised galleries built for the village performers in the west end of most churches. He makes a lovely description of the band in 'Under the Greenwood Tree'. These musical groups consisted of players of various musical instruments, fiddles, bass viols or cellos, clarinet, flute and serpent with a choir of four parts. Often, the same musical part or the same instrument would be passed down the generations, always doing the same line. Unfortunately, many of the Victorian



architects, as part of their 'improvements' to churches, demolished the galleries, partly as they were in such disrepair but also replace the old groups that were going out of fashion. Milborne St. Andrew had a gallery and the marks on the walls in the lower part of the church tower can still be just made out.

Puddletown retains a gallery as does Winterborne Abbas. As part of the improvements the musicians were no longer required to play as they were replaced by barrel organs or conventional organs. Luckily, copies of the sheet music remained in some churches and have been saved mostly in the Dorset History Centre in Dorchester.

One person who went to some lengths to save the scraps of manuscript was Reverend Pickard-Cambridge of Bloxworth. He rewrote the parts to 42 carols that were from various churches in the county and published them in the early 1900s. These books were republished in small numbers in the late 1960s by the Dorchester Museum and they are still sung every year at a special service at Bloxworth church just before Christmas. The original, words only pamphlets, are circulated to the congregation at the beginning of the service to be returned for safe keeping at the end. The style of music is unique in these reprints having been modified to the style of Pickard-Cambridge.

Further back in history there was a man called William Knapp who was born in Wareham in 1698 and lived much of his life in Poole until his death in 1768. He worked as a glove maker and was also the parish clerk. He was active as choir master in St. James in Poole visiting many other churches in the county to train and encourage other church choirs. He wrote a number of hymns and gave many of them the names of Dorset places, of which Wareham is still to be found in hymn books. He also wrote Anthems set to some psalms. One that he wrote in 1738 was to Psalm 18, 'In my trouble I called upon the lord and complained' and includes the words 'there went a smoke in his presence, and consuming fire out of his mouth so that coals were kindled', which was to commemorate the great fire of Blandford in 1731 Unfortunately, the clergy were strict about what could be performed and did not allow this anthem. It has been suggested (Dorset Life 2009) that it has never been performed as the manuscript was lost, it has been now found and is under rehearsal by the Ridgeway Singers and Band for performances later this year in Dorchester, Poole and Blandford Forum, possibly as a premiere. The fire was not the first in Blandford as there was one in 1713 which prompted the town to have three fire engines. This, however, was not enough as in 1731 a young boy at a soap boilers workshop allowed the fire under the boilers to get out of hand and it spread rapidly through the whole town before it could be extinguished.

At one time in the hamlet of Belchalwell, just north of Bulbarrow, there was an ale house run by a man called Ben Rose, helped by his wife. As well as a publican Ben was a fiddle player and was much in demand in the area for dances, weddings, parties and other events. He wrote down his own tunes, but also ones that came his way from visitors and pedlars who carried and sold sheet music. He wrote them into a small book until the 1820s. The alehouse has long been closed, but by an amazing chance a few years ago, this small book was seen in a bookshop in Brighton by someone who recognised the name

Belchalwell and realised that it belonged in Dorset to where it has returned. Subsequently, a facsimile of the book with a CD of all the tunes played on a violin with additional information has been published with the title 'Benjamin's Book' and is available in the music shop in Durngate street in Dorchester.



Finally, many of the sources mentioned are regularly used and performed by the Ridgeway Singers and Band with four concerts in Christmas 2021, a William Barnes birthday tea in March 2022 and the William Knapp Anthem to be performed later this year. Some of the choir's performances can be seen and heard on the website www.ridgewaysingersandband.org.

#### **Dewlish Church Notes**

Knowing more about what's in your food

WITH the easing of Covid restrictions many people will now be eating meals out and will start to notice changes to the way that their food is described.

In the past, food and drink from places such as cafes, restaurants, pubs and takeaways were not required to display nutritional information. This made it difficult for consumers to make informed and healthier choices about the food they were buying.

From April 2022, new legislation will require large businesses with over 250 employees to display calorie information for the food and drink that they prepare for customers to eat immediately.

There are some exemptions, but any business covered by the regulations will need to display accurate calorie information at the point where a customer chooses their food. Information can be provided on physical menus, online menus, or labels.

#### The types of businesses covered can include:

- Restaurants, fast food outlets, cafes, pubs and supermarkets
- Home delivery services

citizens

advice

- Cafes and takeaways within larger shops and venues, such as supermarkets, department stores, and entertainment venues such as cinemas
- Specialist food stores, delicatessens, sweet shops and bakeries
- Contract catering for example for events and canteens
- Domestic transport businesses including planes, trains and ferries.

The changes are part of the Government's strategy to tackle obesity. Having access to accurate calorie information about food and drink ordered will make it easier for consumers to make healthier food choices for themselves and their families when eating out.

Dorset Council Trading Standards will be working with businesses to help them to better understand the changes needed. If you find something you feel is false or misleading please contact Trading Standards by calling the Citizens Advice Consumer Service on 0808 223 1133.

### Learning together and having fun





Our Reception Class learnt all about Chinese New Year and discovered that they set off fireworks to ward/scare off bad spirits. So using paint and hand tools on black paper we created our own firework picture . . . starting off our learning by inviting good spirits and luck into the classroom with a cleaning (a tradition to start the new year, fresh). It was needed, there was paint, mud and sand EVERYWHERE!

Miss Wittman set an obstacle course up in the hall. After reading the story 'The Legend of the Chinese Zodiac' we pretended that the hall was the river and we had to travel safely across using the apparatus.

Re-enacting the story of the Chinese zodiac but with a twist . . . we changed the ending! The children can tell you who they thought should win the race and why.

We made lanterns by decorating red paper using charcoal and glitter. Then using scissors we cut lines through the paper and left them to dry. We returned our lanterns and with Miss Wittman's help secured the edges and handle using a stapler.

What a treat, we had Chinese food for snack today . . . everyone tried a bit of everything, which is fantastic because I am

sure that not all of the children have had these dishes before. We had meat dumplings, vegetable spring rolls, won ton soup, stir fry vegetables, noodles (chow mein), prawn crackers and a fortune cookie. We talked about what the dishes symbolise and why they are traditionally eaten such as longevity, wealth, health, happiness and family. We even used chopsticks to eat with, tricky but delicious.

After we had tried different Chinese food, Miss Wittman wondered which was the most popular so we decided to carry out a survey. We asked each person whether they liked the different food items, if they did then we drew a smiley face but didn't if they weren't keen on that dish.

After investigating sounds we took it in turns to parade around the school. Lanterns to light the way and dancing dragons to banging drums to welcome the lunar new year.

To finish our lunar new year themed learning I invited the children to make a lucky red envelope. I didn't offer any instruction, apart from to say that the envelope needed to hold a (chocolate) coin without falling out . . . it was amazing to see how independently (and successfully) the children worked. So focused

#### What we do

The Family Programme – Our Family Programme provides young people and families with a safe environment and structured activities to spend time together to reconnect and rebuild. We support them to communicate positively, respect each other's thoughts and feelings, learn new skills and achieve therapeutic outcomes, such as building confidence, self esteem and resilience.

We believe that these positive experiences will create lasting, positive change in their lives. Families visit the farm at weekends, during school holidays for the day or overnight and during the

We welcome people from many walks of life such as those that are on a gap year or retired, people that are hoping to improve their mental and emotional health and those that are unemployed or looking to gain skills and experience for their CV. We need a mentor to work alongside and support new or vulnerable members of the club.

To support our provision and enable the wonderful work we do, the resident warden will form part of the wider team of dedicated resident volunteers. Volunteering for the charity will be

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

# **Councillors invite suggestions for Annual Parish Meeting**

THE Parish Council (PC) meeting started with discussion about minutes of the previous meetings. Mr. Lock wanted the minutes to reflect his suggestion that it would be prudent to conduct a business stress test on the proposed preschool facilities within the Camelco development – following recent comments that the Ladybirds has been making a loss for a number of years. As this was not a matter for planning PC agreed to accept the minutes as they were, and exclude Mr. Lock's suggestion.

#### Milborne Jubilee Jamboree

There is a timetable of events – see page 16 for more details. Following discussions about camping at the sports ground, it will be possible to accommodate up to 20 campers.

There will be costs for decorations and signposting. No money will be spent on a marquee - if the weather isn't good on the day the event will be postponed.

#### **Dorset Council Report**

- There is an explanation why land searches (when moving house) are taking longer than the target of 10 days.
- Dorset will host its first ever stage of Tour of Britain on Saturday 10 September 2022.
- A section has been included on the latest changes to policies around the maintenance and management of highway verges which includes reducing the frequency of cutting.
- Enforcement an east Dorset resident was recently successfully prosecuted for ignoring Planning Enforcement Notice for putting a building on the green belt and hopes that this will dispel the myth that the council do not prosecute people who break planning laws.
- Moors Valley, in Ashley Heath, won the Dorset Tourism Awards Large Visitor Attraction of the year.
- There is reference to a new scheme called Pause, which supports vulnerable women who have children removed from their care. This will hopefully reduce the problem.
- There will be a Beacon Lighting Event to celebrate the Jubilee on 2nd June 2022 at 9.15pm.
- The NSPCC hotline (0808 800 5000) is available to keep children safe from sexual abuse.
- The Council will continue to webcast meetings using the equipment that was purchased for the purpose, from 15th February 2022.

Full details of the report will be available on the website.

#### Speed indicating device (SID)

Clerk Lewin's paper flagged an increased cost. Originally it was agreed that a cheaper SID would be purchased from Dorset Council, but failed trials. The more expensive SID will cost £2,495 with the rest of the costs to remain the same. Total cost of project will be £4,170. There is money available in the community asset reserve to cover the extra costs.

SIDs are proven to reduce the speed of vehicles. The village Speedwatch team will take responsibility to switch the locations of the SID. It was approved by the PC to purchase the more expensive SID, which comes with a two-year guarantee.

#### Representative to Village Hall Management Committee

Cllr Stevens was appointed to join the Village Hall Management Committee. Mr. Frost was delighted with the appointment.

#### Appointment of new internal auditor

PC previously stated that they wanted to go with a fixed fee firm, and Clerk Lewin was tasked with due diligence on internal auditors around our area. After contacting 11 parishes Clerk

Lewin recommended that JP Consultants were chosen. Last year their fixed rate was £70 but was not sure what the cost will be this year. Clerk Lewin confirmed that he was happy with the qualifications of JP Consultants.

#### Tree for the Jubilee

Cllr Williams likes the idea of a tree being planted in the village for the jubilee, and a plaque purchased to say why and when it was planted. A plaque from Woodland Trust charity would be around £50. The plaque endorsed by Buckingham Palace is from the Royal British Legion charity and that is nearer £100, which was considered pricey though would be for a good cause. As long as the tree is planted this year it will appear on an interactive map on a website for anyone who wants to come and visit it. Saplings are free to schools and Councils, but rather than free saplings, Cllr Williams recommended a substantial tree is bought, costing about £100, and suggested a flowering cherry tree, native to England, that wouldn't get too big. Regarding location, the Parish Pit and the War Memorial areas are both full. Options suggested were on Milton Road - Stileham Bank and Hopsfield areas as these are central to the village. The cost of the tree would come from the Jubilee fund. Next steps:

- get permission from Dorset Council to plant a tree;
- go to the public to ensure that they are happy with the location and the type of tree;
- investigate the cost of a tree, the cost of a plaque, and options for a tree guard to protect the tree.

#### **Annual Parish Meeting items**

Will be held on 2nd May and is a meeting where the public will set the agenda. The public will be invited to meet with the PC to share what they would like the PC to do. The cllrs were asked how large or small they would like the meeting to be. In the past there have been speakers, eg information about crime. Cllrs were asked to share details of any external speakers that will encourage the public to come to the meeting then to let the Clerk Lewin know. The public in attendance were asked what they thought:

- Mr Lock suggested that evening time during the week wasn't a good time as people have families—people came out for the Neighbourhood plan, and that was held on the weekend. PC response was the timing of the meeting was not the issue.
- Mr Frost stated that refreshments (hot drinks and cake) for the Remembrance parade were offered and there were a good number of people were in attendance. He suggested alcohol might not be appropriate. The response from the PC was that offering alcohol was legal and "would encourage local tax payers to the meeting".

It was agreed to put a message out on Facebook to invite ideas for the meeting from the public.

#### **Public Participation**

Cllr Stephens, and Sandie Sach are off to Cambodia! They are paying for the trip but will be raising funds to give to charities of their choice – Cllr Stephens's charity is Shelter Box, and Sandie's is a Dementia charity. To raise charity funds they will be running a Community Café in the Village Hall on the second Saturday of the month (except May), from the 9th April till September, 10.00am to 12 noon. People will be able to purchase hot drinks, cake, bacon sandwiches, as well as purchasing plants and second-hand books. Well behaved dogs will be welcome. See pages 13 and 20 for more details.

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# The History Group Presentation on a project "West Stour at the Millennium"

DIANA West and Dr. Brian Harper came from West Stour to talk about their book, started in 1999 in response to a John Ash book "West Stour in Dorset". The original concept was to make a photographic record of each and every house in their village for the Millennium. This was to provide a 'snapshot in time' and to complement his book. Four volunteers formed the main organisers but many others contributed to the endeavour. As it was intended to use IT to produce the book it was essential to have a computer expert on the team. Using the existing Village Hall newsletter, all parishioners were circulated with an explanation of their intentions asking for their permission to take a picture of their house as well as providing a list of the residents in their property from 1900 to 1999 (if known). Only one household refused.

West Stour is one of a group of villages in the Stour Valley, recorded as settlements in the Domesday Book. Its open fields were enclosed in 1779. Its church chancel dates back to the 13th century with bells from the 17th and 18th century. As well as providing this snapshot the Millennium Book charts the lives of the villagers over that period of time. Without the considerable help and cooperation of local people no such parish history could have been undertaken. This, the original four enthusiasts had in abundance. Funding was enhanced by a grant of £100 from the Dorset Rural Development Area Community Projects Fund. All householders and businesses provided this help and cooperation. Use was made of Reference Libraries in Dorchester and Yeovil and (what was then known as) the Dorset Records Office, also the clerk of the Stours Parish Council, the secretary of the West Stour Church Meeting and the Sherborne Estates. Henstridge Airfield made possible the aerial shots also providing the fuel and pilot for an aircraft from Buckland Newton Hire. The authors concluded the book with these words: "So here at the end of a century and millennium, West Stour is still a haven of peace in a very noisy world. Some old traditions continue such as harvest festival and Christingle Service (with the additions in 1986) of November 5th Bonfire Party and 'Happy Hour' at the Village Hall on Boxing Day"

Other members of the History Group recounted their own research beginnings showing a willingness to, perhaps, emulate the West Stour project. Many things would be easier now, with modern forms of technology and communication. Others would be more difficult. This village is much larger (roughly a thousand more people than West Stour), but is currently more in touch due to the Community Page on Facebook and, of course, the *Reporter* delivered to every resident! There are a myriad of skills and a richness of material which could be mobilised with a will and a way.

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
