Jubilee celebrations in the past

AS we get ready to celebrate Her Majesty's 70 year reign how did Milborne celebrate the jubilees of the past? Local newspapers gave full details of how Dorset celebrated.

Queen Victoria celebrated her Golden Jubilee in June 1887. In Milborne they raised funds for the rehanging of the bells in the church and purchasing an extra one. On the actual day they gave all the children a tea with amusements and all the labourers and their wives had a dinner in the evening.

Queen Victoria also celebrated her Diamond Jubilee in 1897. This time there was again a tea for the children and a dinner for adults followed by fireworks.

King George V celebrated his Silver Jubilee in May 1935. There was an outside church service followed by the distribution of jubilee mugs given to the children under 16. There were sports followed by tea for the children. In the evening a social event was held in the schoolroom commencing with listening to the King's speech on the wireless. Speed device installed on Milton Road

A SPEED indicating device (SID) has been installed on Milton Road to display the speed of vehicles approaching it, reminding drivers that the speed limit is 30mph. There are two locations on the road where the device has been approved to be used, one northbound, the other southbound, and it will be swapped regularly between the two. The Community Speedwatch group was behind the request for the device and with the support of the Parish Council, which funded the equipment and installation (a total of $\pounds 4.5k$), it is hoped that it will have a positive effect on vehicles' speed entering the village.

Kevin's big jump for Dorset Air Ambulance

There are many different ways to celebrate or mark a significant birthday, but Kevin Cox, from Swiss Cottage on Dorchester Hill. wanted an unforgettable experience for his 70th birthday. But what should it be for someone who is a little bit scared of heights? Jump out of a plane at 15,000 feet? That should do



the trick! Kevin tells us why he decided to throw himself forward for a tandem skydive, in aid of a charity close to his heart.

"About a year ago I thought it was time to decide on something special for my forthcoming 70th birthday. The first thing, of course, was to arrange a party. The next thing was to find an activity which I would never forget or possibly do again. I also wanted to raise money for the Dorset and Somerset Air Ambulance (DSAA) – my eldest son works there as an advanced clinical nurse. I hear about some of the calls that he is involved with and the pressure all the team are under to save lives. You may have heard of one of the calls recently when a 15-year-old schoolgirl was run over by a bus in Corfe Mullen. Without their fast response, her injuries would have been a lot worse and she was flown to Southampton hospital. She thankfully is now recovering at home. The air ambulance relies totally on funding from the general public as the government do not contribute, sadly.

The tandem skydive was booked for the 25th April at Old Sarum airfield with Go Skydive. It came around very quickly and my nerves started to gain momentum. I arrived at 8.00am and had to register, signing all the disclaimers as you'd expect. Then, after a 30-minute wait, I was called to attend a video about the flight. Then more paperwork to read and sign and then another half hour wait. This was to match the weights of the jumpers with the instructors and to see how many people were jumping at the various heights.

There was then brief training on what would happen and the signals the instructor would give me when we are in freefall and so on. We were then hung from straps to make sure we could raise our legs on landing. This is the most dangerous part of the jump as your legs – and the instructors – can be broken or worse.

All the straps were adjusted, safety gear such as goggles and gloves provided – but no helmet (which I thought was strange!). We were then escorted to a holding area near the plane and introduced to the instructor. This was two hours after I had arrived so you can imagine how my nerves were at this stage. We then went to the plane and shuffled down two benches – there were eight of us jumping and eight instructors on board and a pilot (that always helps!).

The plane took off and we reached the required height. The skies were clear now and the views over Salisbury were amazing. The instructor then attached himself to me and kept talking and asking me questions so he knew that I would be ok. Apparently, it's not uncommon for people to arrive at this point then refuse to jump. The plane door opens and the first people shuffle to the door. I was to be out third. I then had to hang though the open door, legs dangling with the instructor holding onto the

plane. Then, with no warning, he pushes off, and it all starts to happen – we are now both in freefall! This part only lasts about thirty seconds at 125mph, but it seems like a lifetime of no control. He then gives me instructions by tapping on my shoulder; to wave, look happy, and thumbs up. Plus, to keep my hands on the two straps ready for the chute to come out. Which it did – we went up in the air and everything slowed down. I was so relieved to feel that! The noise then dropped a tad and we could talk to each other. He wanted to do a few tricks with the chute to make it a more exciting trip down – at this point I was wondering, 'Why, oh why I have I put myself in this position?!'

We then circled the landing area waiting for our time to descend. The landing was very smooth and I did keep my legs up in the air as much as I could. He unstrapped himself and I stayed on the ground a bit longer to help my brain adjust. Then I went back to take off all the gear and pick up the all-important certificate as proof! After thanking my instructor on keeping me alive, I was so relieved I had overcome my worst fears of freefall flight. Full compliments to Go Skydive – it is a very good organisation and everyone there seems to enjoy their jobs.

So far, I have raised about 85% of the target for the charity which is amazing. A Platinum Jubilee

Six months before her coronation, Queen Elizabeth II uttered these words: "I pray that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve him and you, all the days of my life."

Seventy years later, although frailty and age have recently made this more difficult, our Queen continues to serve God and her people to the best of her ability. She has seen governments and politicians come and go. The United Kingdom has had good times and harder ones. In all the vagaries of life, she has remained a calm and steady presence at the head of our nation.

She has faced her own challenges personally and others related to members of her family, but throughout all this she has remained – at least in public – dignified and stately.

In many ways, the life of the Queen is far removed from that of the majority of her subjects. She has wealth way beyond what most of us will ever know and is protected from many of the hardships of life. But wealth and power cannot shield anyone from the devastating effects of bereavement, family breakdowns, watching one's children make mistakes and so on.

From the beginning of her reign 70 years ago to the present day, she has always made it clear that her faith has been important and the foundation on which she has built her life. She often talks about it in her annual Christmas message to the nations, for instance, this is what she said in 2002, as she reflected on her Golden Jubilee: "I know just how much I rely on my own faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning, I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God." And more recently in 2020: "The teachings of Christ have served as my inner light, as has the sense of purpose we can find in coming together to worship."

It is right and proper that the Supreme Governor of the Church of England expresses her faith in her words, deeds and way of life. But our Queen has always been supportive of those of other faith and of no faith at all.

Many villages, towns and cities will be celebrating the Platinum Jubilee this month. As we join in with the parties, picnics, festivities and enjoyment, in person or through our television screens, let us pray for our Queen, giving thanks for her example of faith, commitment and service to our nation for the past 70 years.

Busy night as PS looks to year ahead

THE Annual Village Meeting is an open meeting for parishoners to speak to councillors on ideas they would like to see in the community that are within the power of the Parish Council (PC) for the forthcoming year.

The meeting started with Clerk Lewin clarifying the role of the PC. The PC:

- represents the electorate;
- acts as a facilitator, on behalf of the parishioners, of questions that are presented to Cllr Parker at Dorset Council;
- has no powers on Dorset Council matters, the environment agency and areas of land not owned by the PC.

There are nine meetings a year that are open to the public, which are advertised a week in advance. The PC are governed by law and there are things they have to do at certain times - and the Annual Village Meeting is one of those, and has to be held every year.

Update from Chairman McNair

- May 2021 to April 2022 was a very busy year. There was good participation at the village litter pick when about 13 big sacks of litter were collected from the local area. A new bin has been placed on the Dewlish Road, which has reduced the amount of litter from people out walking, as well as dog fowling, at that end of the village.
- Upgraded benches in open spaces, which were also contributed by members of the public. Also contributed to benches at the village hall and the sports club.
- Continued with the multi year grass cutting contract, and positive feedback has been received from the villagers that the village is looking better.
- Continued to support the Community Speed Watch programme. The Speed Indicating Device (SID) was installed in the village on 4th May (the day of the meeting) - and is working. It is hoped that this will reduce the speeding problem on Milton Road.
- Looking forward to 2022/2023 the main projects:
 Huntley Down development will trigger elements of section 106 funding. The plan is to use some of that money to deliver the traffic calming elements of the Neighbourhood Plan.
- Improving accessibility to footpaths around the village where there are stiles – stiles cause barriers, especially for the elderly, those with children in buggies, or if you are walking a dog that struggles with stiles;

Jubilee Jamboree update was given by Cllr Stephens

- *Thursday* there will be a themed night at The Royal Oak.
- *Friday* there will be a film at the Village Hall, which will be free for parishioners.
- **Saturday** parishioners will meet at the Village Hall and there will be a procession to the sports field with scarecrows and in fancy dress. There will be events at the sports ground. People should bring their own picnics and drinks to the sports ground.
- **Saturday evening** there will be a celebration at the sports ground with a band paid for by Wyatt Homes. During their break there will be open mic contact Cllr Stephens on 07282 650104 to sign up.
- Sunday parishioners are being encouraged to do their own street parties. There will be a church service in Dewlish in the morning. The evening service at 6.00pm will be in Milborne St. Andrew.

- Gardening Club have arranged a container competition.
- The Players will judge a scarecrow competition

Items for discussion from Parishioners

Sports Club representative Mr Lock, speaking on behalf of all trustees, would like the PC to adopt a more proactive supporting role towards the Sports Club. One way of doing this would be a joint working group venture to deliver the priority policy issues embedded within the Neighbourhood Plan. PC requested Mr Lock email the PC and the Village Hall.

Question to the PC regarding the 12.5% increase of the precept this year. The last two years there was a decrease and prior to that it was an increase of 6.7%. Response from the council:

- Inflation is a big driver, and the increase of costs of the grass cutting contract is one example of that.
- This year the PC has been more active with items for the community.
- The Clerk's responsibilities had increased and so the role went through the job appraisal process which resulted in the Clerk being due more points, and a pay increase.

The response to a question about the PC's attitude towards increased taxation was that historically PCs have increased precept by a percentage, which is the wrong thing to do. Precept should be based on the anticipated expenditure for the year. Milborne PC review planned expenditure, and an increase/ decrease will be based on that planning. This explains the reasons why it has gone down in previous years as there was less money planned to be spent. The Milborne St. Andrew precept is considerably lower than other local PC precepts. The PC stated that they look for best value for money and hold people accountable for contract obligations.

There was discussion about the policy statements in the Neighbourhood Plan and whether the PC should work these up into workable projects. The policy statements are made up from aspirations about what the villagers want and it was felt that the PC should take the lead. PC said it was up to the community to come up with projects, and not for councillors.. If a parishioner has a suggestion for a project, please contact the PC with proposals and costings so that it can be discussed.

Some projects that have been identified from the neighbourhood plan are:

- The Community Land Trust the PC has gone out to the villages on three occasions but have not had volunteers come forward. This is still on the plan but need volunteers to help with this as the PC cannot do it on their own;
- *Traffic management* will be progressed as a priority with funds from section 106 Huntley Down development;
- Conservation Area project that is being actively pursued will come to fruition in 2022.

Parishioners should note that the village Facebook group is not the right place for communication with the PC. Facebook is more like a noticeboard – use it for an opinion, to advertise what is going on in the community. Councillors will not respond on behalf of the PC on Facebook.

Any member of the community that has something that they would like to raise with the PC should either:

- come along to the monthly PC meetings everyone is welcome and there is an opportunity to share ideas, or

Full council meeting

The litter pick followed a similar process to the one in autumn last year. We picked up considerably less rubbish than last time. There was good support and help from Scouts and local people. There was some fly tipping cleared from Milton Road. Will plan to do it again September/October time.

There were concerns over the ploughed field behind Homefield. Cllr Redding had recently spoken to the farmer about why it was done which was that the ground was getting "sheep sick". It has been sown with late spring barley, and will be cultivated from now on until the ground recovers and is suitable for grazing once again.

Dorset Councillors report

- The full council meeting was disrupted by two protesters who, after an opposition motion had been fully debated and defeated on climate change glued themselves to the front desk in the chamber.
- Tour of Britain stage seven will come to Dorset on 10th September. The start and finish locations will be West Bay and Ferndown respectively
- 96% of parents and carers were offered their first choice of school, which is above the national average.
- Parishoners are asked to use the least impactful NHS service, and consider using NHS 111.
